

D'Estaing Plat, Jackson County

The Jackson County Historical Society will meet, Thursday, September 22, 2016, at 6:00 p.m. at the Pat Bell Conference Center, Hurricane Shoals Park. Dan Crumpton, licensed surveyor, will discuss the Original Franklin County plat project and give details on the famous Wofford Settlement Tract. He has mapped these original land plats on modern Georgia Department of Transportation maps so it is easy to correlate the original site to current property use and ownership.



Daniel N. Crumpton, Registered Licensed Surveyor of Warren County, Georgia, received the Outstanding Achievement in the Field of Genealogy award from Georgia Genealogical Society in 2014. More recently, he was awarded the Surveying and Mapping Society of Georgia's 1st place award for a set of his maps of Original Wilkes and Franklin Counties.

Land records are valuable to historians and genealogists who want local details of family life in a specific area. Mr. Crumpton has published seven books on county land records, researching each volume back to the Colonial land plats. Then he has mapped these original land plats on modern Georgia Department of Transportation maps so it is easy to correlate the original site to current property use and ownership.

This involves a herculean task of finding and re-assembling the county plats like giant jig-saw puzzles. Only a skilled and dedicated researcher, such as he, a trained surveyor of over 50 years of service and a graduate of the University of Georgia in forestry and forest land management, is equipped to handle such a task.

D'Estaing Tracts, Hurricane Shoals & Apple Valley

In 1784, a grateful Georgia General Assembly granted Count D'Estaing, Admiral of the French naval fleet at the siege of Savannah during the Revolutionary War, four tracts of land totaling 2,000 acres.

The Count gave the land to his sister before he was quillotined on 28 April 1794. His sister sold the property to Mr. Francis L. Taney, an American living in France and married to a French woman, Berenice. Berenice Arene Taney eventually sold the lands to her brother Ange Michael Gouvain, who moved to Georgia with his family. Gouvain proved to be a poor businessman. Although some lands were sold, the Gouvain family lost most of the property for back taxes.

According to Jackson County Deed book F, pp. 234235 of 15 March 1816, the entire D'Estaing property of 20,000 acres (10,000 acres in Jackson and 10,000 acres in Clarke) was sold to Stephen Thomas of Clarke County for back taxes owed as a result of the levy of the direct tax of the Act of the US Congress of July 14, 1798. the land was sold at public outcry at the court house in Clarke County by the US Marshal John Eppinger.

Colonial surveys in Georgia were made with staff compass and wrought iron surveying chain. As the surveyor traversed the boundaries, he would note the bearing or direction he was going and the distances in chain= (66 feet).



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To surveyors and collectors alike, the link chain symbolizes a rugged era, when surveying tools and techniques were literally defining America. The chain was a precision part of a surveyor's equipment and, as such, had to be calibrated and adjusted frequently, yet was sturdy enough to be dragged through rough terrain for years.

Owning a link chain now captures a bit of this glorious past; to heft it enhances the kinship one feels with the surveyor who toiled in the field long ago. As collectors, we need to identify the type of chain we own, in order to understand its history. Each chain bears the clues of its use, such as the wire gauge used, the materials and design used, the lengths of the whole and of each link, the manufacturer's stamps, the presence or absence of brazing, the tally-tags, and the presence or absence of linking rings. Noting these components will make it possible to approximate the date and purpose of your link chain with the aid of period manufacturer's catalogs. The following is a nicely detailed account from the 1910 Manual of the Principal Instruments used in American Engineering and Surveying, published by the W. & L. E. Gurley Company of Troy, New York.
