450 Little Street, located between the Governor's Mansion and the Commerce Postoffice. The American School of Paperhanging Arts or known locally as the Wallpaper School.



Located at 11 Oak Street, on the corner of South Elm.

The Hardman House, know as *The Governor's Mansion*, was the home of Governor L. G. Hardman. The two story brick Mediterranean style mansion was completed in 1921 and the Governor lived here during both his terms as governor of Georgia (1927-1931). He also lived in the Governor's Mansion in Atlanta , but returned to his home in Commerce whenever possible. Hardman was the first medical doctor to serve as governor of Georgia since before 1800. Governor Hardman died in 1937, but his widow continued to live here until her death in 1953.

The mansion is on the *National Register of Historic Places* and features many facinating architectural details. Numerous windows and French doors throughout the mansion contain their original beveled glass. The veranda wraps around the house to the sun porch and porte cochere. Dr. Hardman insisted on 18" thick walls for the house as a precaution against storms and also had a storm cellar built into the basement.

The house is available for private weddings and special events.



120 Pine Street.

Formerly the home of Dr. William Benjamin Johnson Hardman, 1850 graduate of Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, PA. and father of Lamertine G. Hardman. Coffee and desert will be served at this house after the tour.
